Killers of the Flower Moon:

The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI

- Killers of the August Moon: the Osage
- Murders and the Birth of the FBI by David



Grann. It was a startling reminder that, like the headlines today on the disappearance of many Native American women, greed and complicity toward them is still part of our society today.

The book sets up the beginning with the story of the Osage people who settled in Osage County, Oklahoma. When oil is found on their land, they lease it to the oil companies with the provision that part of the profits be given to any full-blooded Osage who owned the land where it was found. It wasn't long before many of them began to die under mysterious and violent circumstances and the book's main focus is on the investigation of one family in particularly in the 1920's. During this same time frame, a young J. Edgar Hoover is also trying to make a name for himself within the government branch of investigation. This series of crimes becomes his perfect opportunity to implement many new and scientific methods of detecting, and because of the success on solving this particular crime, the Federal Bureau of Investigation is created.

David Grann has written many investigative novels, and it was obvious that he took this story and research he devoted to Killers of the Osage Moon to heart. It has been stated that at least 20 of the murders were officially known, but it is suspected that there were hundreds more because of their ties to oil. —reviewed by Pat Breeding
