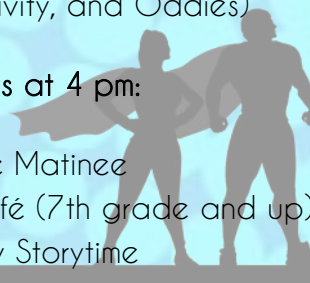

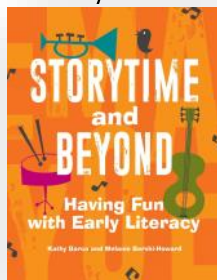

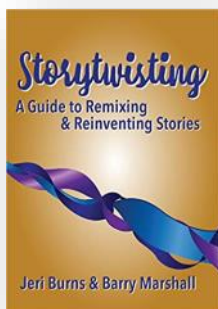
Storytwisting & Storytime and Beyond

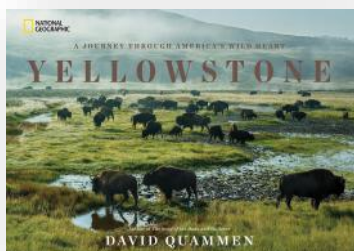
Yellowstone

A Journey Through America's Wild Heart

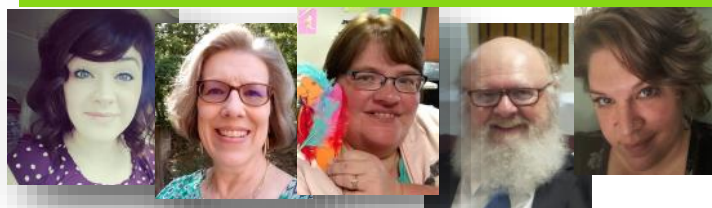
